Supervision begins in the school yard at 8:30am each morning for students in Grades 1-8. There is a line painted designating student and parent areas. As of 8:30am each morning, only students and staff should be in the school yard. FDK students are to enter through the Kindergarten Yard beginning at 8:30am.

It is imperative students arrive on time so that they do not miss valuable instruction within their respective classrooms.

School Organization Changes

Each school year start-up brings some unexpected changes in terms of enrolment and staffing. Staffing and class placements are tentative and based on school enrolment. All school organizational plans are subject to review in early September, based on actual enrolment. If reorganization is necessary and your child is affected, you will be notified of these changes . Your patience and support are greatly appreciated during this transitional time.

Picture Day

Picture Day is booked for September 24th, 2025. Picture Retake Day is booked for October 28th, 2025.

Visitors

All visitors to the school are reminded that they must report to and sign in at the office when first arriving. Adults in the building who are not staff must wear identification stickers for safety reasons. To further ensure the safety of all students and to minimize the traffic in school hallways at arrival and dismissal times, we ask that parents meet their children outside of the school and away from immediate exit doors. Any student leaving the school during the day due to appointments, etc., must be signed out at the office.

Parents in the School Yard

In keeping with Dufferin-Peel School Board Policy, all visitors to the school must report to the office. Particularly in the first days of school, it is important that we all work together to ensure that there are NO adults on school property other than those staff members who are wearing orange safety vests between the hours of 8:30am-3:15pm. You may be known to your child, but you are a stranger to other children. Please make arrangements to meet your child at a specific place at the end of the day. By continuing to work together, we can ensure a safe environment for your child. Thank you for setting the example and adhering to this important guideline.

Lunch Time Procedures

All students are requested to stay for lunch and will remain on school property throughout the lunch period. Please inform the child's teacher and office if your child needs to go home for lunch. The student must proceed directly home after signing out in the office and upon return signing in. Your co-operation in the mutual concern for the safety of our students is appreciated. Lunches being dropped off should be clearly labelled with your child's name. Please ensure that your child is aware that his/her lunch is being dropped off at the school. We kindly request your understanding that we will not interrupt classes to notify students that their lunch has arrived. In keeping with DPCDSB Policy, students are not permitted to share food.

Cell Phone Use

In accordance with PPM 128, all students must keep their phones powered off or on silent mode and out of sight for the school day, unless otherwise allowed by the educator during instructional time for a specific purpose. Students are not to have their phones outside during recess. If you need to get in touch with your child during the school day, please contact the main office. Please review these rules with your child. We appreciate your cooperation in maintaining a positive learning environment for all at Christ the King CES.

Emergency Information & First Day Forms

It is important that we are able to contact someone in the case of an emergency. Please fill out and return the emergency student verification sheets that will be sent home soon with your child. Remember those people you list as contacts are given permission to pick up your child from school. Please return all GF Forms sent home promptly.

Student Illness

Students who are ill should be kept home where they are most comfortable and can get better, sooner. A child who is too ill to go out for recess is too ill to be at school. Your co-operation to keep your child home

when he/ she is not feeling well is greatly appreciated.

Open House/Meet the Teacher BBQ

Our Open House/Meet the Teacher BBQ Night will take place on Thursday, September 25th. Please

consider attending this important event. More information will follow in the coming weeks.

Crossing Guard

Please remind your children to wait for and cross with the crossing guard (either at McMaster, the Collegeway, or

Garthwood) at all times to further ensure their safety.

Kiss and Ride

In order to ensure the safety of our students, parents/guardians are asked to adhere to the following

drop-off/ pick-up rules:

1. Parents/Guardians who are dropping off/picking up Kindergarten, Grade 1 students, or those requiring

assistance, will park in a designated parking spot and walk their child to their designated area in the school

yard.

2. Students in Grades 2—8 (who do not require assistance) may be dropped off/picked up in the Kiss 'N

Ride area.

3. All students who are picked up at the end of the day will proceed to the Kiss 'N Ride area.

4. In order to maintain traffic flow, please leave Kiss 'N Ride area once drop off/pick up is complete.

5. Please do not leave your car unattended or idling.

6. There is no parking/stopping in Drive Through Lanes, Bus Lanes, and any area other than a designated

parking spot.

DPCDSB Concussion Protocol

The DPCDSB has a Concussion Protocol in place. ALL students who sustain a head injury during the school day, however minor, will receive a Concussions Information Sheet to take home. We ask parents/guardians to review this pamphlet and seek medical attention for your son/daughter if you feel it is required. All head injuries will be logged and reported to parents/guardians. We ask that you please inform the school as soon as possible if and when your son/ daughter sustains a concussion as a result of a school incident or as a result of an activity outside of school.

Student Medical Information

Please make sure that the school is aware of any important medical information regarding your child(ren) in order that we can be properly prepared to deal with an emergency situation.

Food Allergies – Anaphylaxis Awareness

Christ the King CES is an Allergen Aware school. There are pupils in attendance who suffer from severe and life-threatening allergies to certain foods, such as dairy, eggs, peanuts, tree nuts, seaweed and seafood. Exposure to the smallest quantities can trigger a severe life-threatening reaction. The safety and well-being of all of our students is a priority. In order to ensure the safety and well-being of all pupils, we request that you NOT send any lunches or snacks that contain peanuts and/or tree nuts, including peanut butter substitute products such as WOW Butter. Please make sure that all of your children's caregivers are aware of the food restrictions. Do not send food for birthdays or special occasions. In keeping with DPCDSB Policy, such food will not be distributed at the school. Should there be additional allergy concerns in specific classrooms, the classroom teacher will share information.

Asthma Awareness

Christ the King CES continues to participate in "We Share the Air", a Scent Sensitivity Awareness Campaign. There are students in attendance who suffer from life-threatening asthmatic conditions to air pollutants. Exposure even to minimal odors may cause potential life-threatening reactions.

Medication Distribution and Storage of Medication

Some of our students require medication during the school day. All medication is to be stored in the office, except where directed by a physician. DPCDSB Policy requires that we have signed request/authorization forms from parents and the supervising physician in the office. These forms are available in the office. If you have not completed these forms - especially for EpiPens - please contact the office. In some cases of asthma, the doctor may advise that a student should carry an inhaler. We comply with advice of doctors in these situations, but we must be made aware of the arrangements. When medication is approved for storage, it must be labeled with the student's name, name of medication, prescription information and dosage. The medication is to be brought to the school in the bottle that was provided by the pharmacist. Medication that is sent to school without the proper documentation will not be stored or dispensed by school personnel. This also applies to over-the counter medications such as, Tylenol, aspirin, ibuprofen, cough medicine, Benadryl, and allergy medications.

Medical Plans of Care

All students with a prevalent medical condition (Asthma, Anaphylaxis, Epilepsy and Diabetes) must have a Plan of Care completed and returned to school as soon as possible. If your child already has a Plan of Care on file with the main office and their diagnosis/condition has not changed, you do not need to submit a new Plan of Care. Please return the GF Form which will come home with your child on the first day of school. Plans of Care ensure that school staff can act appropriately and effectively in the event of a medical emergency. Hard copies of these forms will be sent home with your child. Please be reminded that Epi-Pens have a shelf life of one year.

Student Insurance Coverage

As required by the Education Act and the Ministry of Education, the Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board annually provides parents with information about student accident insurance coverage. Although enrolment is voluntary, the DPCDSB encourages parents to take advantage of the insurance coverage, especially if their child/children participate in sports, excursions/field trips, or, if the parents do not have dental insurance coverage. Please refer to the pamphlet that will be sent home during the first week of school for more information. Parents alone have the right to insure their children. You may consider purchasing coverage for your child at www.insuremykids.com or by calling toll free at 1-800-463-KIDS (5437).

Dogs on School Property

Please be aware that dogs should not be brought onto school property. We have students with severe allergies. If your dog is escorting you and your child to and from school please make arrangements to meet your child on the sidewalk in front of the school.

Fire/Lockdown/Hold & Secure Drills

Throughout the year school personnel review safety procedures with the students on a number of topics. Emergency evacuation/fire drills are conducted to ensure that everyone is aware of the procedures to follow in order to exit the building safely. Our School Board has also established Hold and Secure and Lockdown procedures should a high-risk incident involving weapons occur on school property, that could endanger the lives and/or the safety of students and/or staff. We will continue to practice the Emergency Lockdown Procedures and Fire Evacuation procedures throughout the school year.

School Cash Online

For safety and efficiency reasons, we would like to reduce the amount of cash & cheques coming into our school. Please join the thousands of parents who have already registered and are enjoying the convenience of paying ONLINE! It takes less than 5 minutes to register. Our goal is to reach 100% of our families using School Cash Online. We have found that School Cash Online dramatically increased the efficiency and security of money coming into the school, reducing much of the time required when dealing with money. If you need help with registering, please call our office and we would be happy to help you. We thank you for supporting School Cash Online.

Truth and Reconciliation Week & Canada's National Day for Truth & Reconciliation

We will recognize Canada's National Day for Truth and Reconciliation on Tuesday, September 30th. We encourage everyone to wear orange. Truth and Reconciliation Week takes place from September 22nd through September 26th.

Students and Families who Identify as First Nations, Metis and/or Inuit

The Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board is providing an opportunity for students to self-identify their First Nation, Métis and/or Inuit ancestry in a voluntary and confidential manner. This program will allow the Board to provide expanded supports, events and opportunities to First Nation, Inuit and Métis students. Relevant information will be sent directly to students and families about upcoming cultural events and opportunities which help to build community and a sense of Indigenous pride in DPCDSB.

Bicycles, Scooters, Rollerblades, E-Bikes, E-Scooters

A safety reminder to all students that bikes, scooters, roller blades, e-scooters and e-bikes are to be walked both on and off the school property. Bikes, scooters, e-scooters and e-bikes are to be locked on the bike racks outside. We do not have facilities to store or secure these items indoors, so there is an added risk of damage or theft and they are not encouraged to be brought to school. The school is not responsible for these items. Your cooperation is appreciated.

Student Agendas

Once again this year, teachers will be distributing agendas to the students in grades 1-8 that are used to develop their organizational skills as well as facilitate communication regarding homework, deadlines and special events. Please take some time to look over the agenda with your child, it is filled with useful information, including the Catholic Code of Conduct. It is particularly important to emphasize that the agenda is to be used daily to assist your child in organizing his/her time and to keep parents informed as to what is happening in class and in the school. It is a great vehicle to jot down a short note to the teacher and the teacher can respond in the same way. Students may use the agenda and/or organizational tools in the learning management system for their class.

STOPR Transportation Procedures

STOPR TRANSPORTATION PROCEDURES

The distance criteria for transportation eligibility must be more than:

- 1.0 kilometer Kindergarten and Grade 1
- 1.6 kilometers for Grades 2 4
- 2.0 kilometers for Grades 5 8
- 3.8 kilometers for Grades 9 1

If your child is moving to grade 2, grade 5, or grade 9 in the 2025-2026 school year, their eligibility status for transportation may be changing. Eligibility information can be accessed at the website noted below. All transported kindergarten and grade 1 students are required to be met by a parent/ caregiver when disembarking from their bus on their return trip from school.

Catholic School Council Nominations





RE: FLEMENTARY SCHOOL ORGANIZATION PLANS FOR 2025-2026

Welcome back from what I hope was a very restful and safe summer spent with friends and family. We are especially excited to welcome our Junior Kindergarten students and any students new to our schools this year.

A number of years ago, the Ministry of Education implemented a cap on the maximum number of students that may be enrolled in primary classes (Grade 1 to Grade 3). We continue to ensure primary classes are capped at 20 students. In rare instances, a small number of primary classes may have up to a maximum of 23 students, while still being compliant with ministry of Education requirements.

Full Day Kindergarten operates on a board-wide average of 26 students per class with a teacher and a Designated Early Childhood Educator (DECE). This means that some Kindergarten classes may be smaller than 26 and some may be larger. Where a Kindergarten class has 15 students or less, there is a teacher only. The provincial government also requires that the average class size of Grade 4 to Grade 8 classes not exceed a board-wide average of 24.5 students. This means that some classes will be larger than 24 or 25 students, and some classes will be smaller.

As has occurred in past years, parents/guardians should be aware that grade/class reorganization for September may be necessary in order to meet these mandated class size requirements. All school organization plans are subject to review during this time, based on actual enrolment. Where the need to adjust class plans is identified due to unanticipated enrolment fluctuations, both in remote only and in-person classes, reorganization will be implemented effective Tuesday, September 16. This reorganization may also occur for students who are in remote only classes.

A school reorganization <u>may</u> result in your child(ren) moving from one class to another. Teachers will be preparing for the transition on September 15 Professional Activity Day. Please know that your child(ren)'s school principal will keep you duly informed should there be a change to your child(ren)'s class placement, including remote only students.

The Ministry of Education publication, "An Introduction to Combined Grades," provides information for parents/guardians regarding combined grade classes and is attached for your additional information and reference. Please be assured that the DPCDSB will continue, as always, to provide a faith-based quality education for all students entrusted in its care with an emphasis on student safety, well-being and achievement.

As always, thank you for your continued support and understanding and best wishes for a safe and successful school year.

WHAT IS A COMBINED CLASSROOM?

Combined classes group children from two or more consecutive grades in one classroom. Schools combine classes for a variety of reasons. This includes organizing classes to meet student learning needs and combining grades to balance class size.

All classrooms include students with a range of skills and abilities. Combined classes are neither better nor worse than single-grade classes. They are simply one of the many ways schools meet students' academic and social development needs.

HOW ARE STUDENTS CHOSEN FOR COMBINED CLASSES?

Principals and staff consider a variety of factors when grouping children into classes, including:

- Learning styles
- Social skills
- Academic needs
- And many other factors

All classrooms, whether single-grade or combined, include students performing at a range of achievement levels. In every case, schools strive to create a classroom environment that will support the needs of all students.

HOW WILL A COMBINED CLASS AFFECT MY CHILD?

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

Several studies have found that students in combined classes do just as well as students in single-grade classes. In fact, some students actually do better in language and reading.

IMPROVED SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

Canadian studies show that children in combined classes have more opportunities for emotional and social growth. The rich social environment helps students:

- Learn how to work on their own and as part of a team
- Build leadership abilities as they work together and help each other
- Develop decision-making skills, and become more self-motivated and responsible
- Learn in an environment that reflects the real world. The diverse ideas and opinions of classmates help expand students' perspectives.

WILL MY CHILD GET ENOUGH INDIVIDUAL ATTENTION?

Every day, in both single-grade classes and combined grades, teachers work with large groups, small groups, and individual students. But students in combined classrooms also benefit from a broader support structure.

Younger children can ask students from the higher grade for help. Older students learn by explaining problems to their younger peers. In fact, peer tutoring can help higher achieving and older students reinforce their knowledge and positive social behaviours.

HOW CAN THE TEACHER TEACH MORE THAN ONE GRADE AT A TIME?

Teachers use many different strategies to teach students in combined grades. They may:

- Introduce a common topic then give each grade a different task or problem.
- Break students into groups to study different problems and report back to the class. These groups can be flexible, including students with varied interests and skills.
- Bring students together for activities like health, physical education, and the arts.

The Ministry of Education has developed strategies that help teachers reach a range of learners. For example, teams from every school in Ontario have been trained in differentiating instruction. This is a strategy that looks at the individual learning needs and progress of each student. The teacher can then identify the range of needs in the classroom and plan a program that meets the needs of all the students.

- Weather is monitored daily for heat advisories and when required, outdoor activities and recesses will be adjusted to limit the time outdoors (i.e. high UV index and/or Humidex +30°C may warrant modified recess periods).
- 2. Students will be advised to find **shaded areas** in the yard. Outdoor physical education classes will be reconsidered when temperature advisories are issued.
- 3. Students are encouraged to bring a refillable water bottle (labelled with their name) to school and to drink frequently throughout the day. We have <u>a multiple</u> refillable water stations as well as drinking fountains.
- 4. Our building is partially **air-conditioned**. The Amphitheatre is used as a cooling station for classes without air conditioning on a rotating basis.
- Classroom lights will remain off and blinds drawn whenever possible.
- 6. Hats, sunglasses and sunscreen (SPF 15 minimum) are strongly recommended to protect students from the harmful rays of the sun. Please wear <u>light-weight</u>, light-colored, loose-<u>fitting</u> clothing that is appropriate for a Catholic school environment and in accordance with the DPCDSB Dress Code Policy. Safe, appropriate footwear is also encouraged, as flip-flops and sandals can be tripping hazards when participating in active play.
- 7. Students will be monitored for **signs and symptoms of heat-related illnesses** (e.g. heavy sweating; weakness; cold, pale and/or clammy skin; fainting; vomiting). First Aid treatment will be administered as required.

Important Update on the DPCDSB Dress Code Policy

March 4, 2025

The Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board (DPCDSB) remains committed to fostering a safe, caring, and inclusive learning environment where all students feel a sense of belonging and can achieve success. Dress codes and school uniforms are designed to support diversity, accessibility, safety, and the dignity of all students.

On January 28, 2025, the Board of Trustees approved updates to **Policy P-2006 Dress Code and School Uniform**. As part of these changes, dress code expectations now require that students ensure the area from the top of the shoulders to mid-thigh is covered.

Additionally, the DPCDSB dress code continues to prohibit any clothing with messages that contain or depict offensive or inappropriate content. Students are not permitted to wear attire that promotes:

- Hate
- Discrimination
- Illegal activity
- Profanity
- Violence
- Political language
- · Threats to health and safety
- Any content that violates the Ontario Human Rights Code

IMPORTANT INFORMATION: KISS AND RIDE, SCHOOL PARKING AND SAFETY CONCERNS

Dear Parents and Guardians:

The safety of our students and staff is of paramount importance. Regrettably, we are seeing an increase in incidents related to traffic circulation at the front of the school, parking lots, and in the Kiss and Ride area, particularly during morning arrival and afternoon dismissal, that are putting students, staff, and other parents/guardians at risk. Vehicles entering the site in the wrong direction, parking and pulling out of no parking zones, parking in bus lanes, and driving at a high rate of speed, to name some of the incident types, are putting the safety of our children, staff, and other parents/guardians in jeopardy. We cannot wait for a serious injury, or worse to occur, before we correct this situation. Concurrent with the traffic safety concerns, we have seen increased aggression directed towards school staff when they attempt to direct vehicles to move from these restricted parking areas. This is not acceptable.

It is imperative that all parents and guardians <u>driving</u> their children to school adhere to the traffic circulation plan and comply with the onsite traffic and parking signage; It is equally imperative that **all drivers** follow the direction of staff managing the traffic circulation on the school site.

When using the Kiss and Ride, you must adhere to the following procedures:

- Be patient with other vehicles as they drop off students.
- Always drive slowly on school property.
- Pull up as close to the other vehicle in front to accommodate other parents/guardians.
- Do not park or get out of your vehicle in this area, even if only for a few seconds.
- Students are to exit the vehicle on the passenger side (right side).
- Once your child has left the vehicle, please exit right away.
- Please do not walk your children through the Kiss and Ride Lane; this can be unsafe.
- When pulling out to pass other stopped cars, proceed with caution.



- CSC members are elected for one school year, from the first meeting of one school year to the first meeting of the next.
- CSC members must be Catholic or a spouse of a Catholic School supporter.

ELECTIONS & APPOINTMENTS OF CSC MEMBERS

- Elections of all members of a Catholic School Council shall be held within the first 30 days of the school year.
- Candidates for CSC can nominate themselves or be nominated from the school community.
- Elections held by secret ballot are required if the number of nominations exceed the allotted CSC positions.
- If nominations are less than the allotted positions, nominees are appointed or acclaimed to council.
- The election of executive positions are held during the first meeting of the Catholic School Council.
- If you have further questions, please speak with your school principal.

CENTRAL COMMITTEE FOR CATHOLIC SCHOOL COUNCILS (CCCSC)

CCCSC is the Central Committee for Catholic School Councils. It is comprised of 2 elected representatives from each family of schools. CCCSC's goal is to promote the Board's vision, values, and sacramental practices. CCCSC provides orientation, training and networking opportunities for local Catholic School Councils (CSC).

The elected members of CCCSC meet monthly at the Catholic Education Centre, these meetings are open to all parents.

School Councils are opportunities for faith formation and collaboration, where parents and school staff learn from each other, pray together, and work alongside each other to ensure all children have opportunities to grow in faith and in their learning.
